
"Most gracious God, to know and love whose will is righteousness, enlighten our souls with the brightness of Thy presence, that we may both know thy will and be enable to perform it."

I have lived in two cities when a strike occurred in this department. I have seen what could happen. Day by day the piles of rubbish grew on the streets. Some years ago in Amsterdam such a situation defeated a candidate for mayor! As the condition got worse the citizens became more and more grumpy. The city officials were, or tried to appear, amused. One day a woman called the mayor and said, "What am I going to do about my rubbish?" By that time the mayor was no longer

amused and he snapped back, "Put it in the middle of the street!" She did. They they arrested her and the fun began. The mayor told me after the next election -- when he was no longer mayor -- I was defeated by rubbish.

Rubbish once hindered the rebuilding of a city. Read the book of Nehemish and discover the fascinating story of the restoration of Jerusalem during the Persian period. In the fourth chapter of this book is the verse: "And Judah said, The strength of the burden-bearers is failing, and there is much rubbish, we are not able to work on the wall.

It was that verse that started me thinking about this whole problem of rubbish. Ferhaps moving this past September increased my interest. We certainly do accumulate things. Not only do we accumulate them, we resist getting rid of them. Someone has taken the position that people started do save things when it was not so easy to make purchases that were needed. So you saved every bit of string, every nail, every scrap of metal, every piece of wire. Some day you might need this in an emergency. There was a feeling a few years ago that the change in American living habits might alter this, but it has not. My Aunt Fanny had an attic. Everything she ever owned was put in that attic. It was a wonderful thing for me to go to her house on a rainy day and be privileged to go up there and explore. Now we do not have attics any more, but we do have store rooms and garages and shed. We manage to fill all the space we have with the accumulations of the years, what is more tagic than someone else's attic? What is more depressing than to so someone else's attic? What is more revealing than to hear a person say, "Now why did I save that?"

Today I want you to think of your mental attics. Not at all of the things that have accumulate there. Your past failures and disappointments. You have kept them and periodically you take them out and look them over. Your past successes and triumphs. These you dust off now and then with loving care. There is a whole corner devoted to grudges—all the recollections

of the unkindness and thoughtlessness you have experience at the hands of other people. Once we went on our vacation and the Parsonage committee did some redecorating in our parsonage. They papered and they had floors refinished. We had to come home one night A side door had been left for the painters and they had the key, but when we went to bed we bolted the door from the inside. In the middle of the night we heard a terrific pounding. Went down and there stood the painter. "I got worried," he said, "I remembered that I had left a rag scaked with the fluid I had been using to clean the floors. It might have burst into flames." So he got up and drove several miles to make sure. But we let these old grudges and resentiments lie around carelessly — they are inflammable! This is what Jesus meant when he said that if you are on the way to make a sacrifice in the temple and suddenly remember that you have a quarrel with someone, put down your gift, go and make things right with your brothers.

There are other things in our attice. Those things that might have happened, What would have happened if we had made a different choice. Long age Gordon Gilkey called these "vanished alternatives." We brood about what could's we think about the road we did not take. You may be shocked when I say that grief can become rubblsh in our lives, cluttering up our days and making it impossible for God to do the things he wants to do for us. Grief can be an enmobling experience leading us to new levels of living, or it can become a deadening influence in our lives. To all of this add the outworn ideas which make us content with our lives as they are. You will refuse to wear last year's hat or to drive last year's car but you are content with last year's sietes. Everywhere in laberatories scientists are trying to bring our knowledge up to date. In addition philosophers and theologians and sociologists apth working to find the tunth. But the rubbish of old ideas makes their work difficult.

You and I must become aware of God's purifying power that can burn up this rubbish in our lives. Too often we have tried to rid ourselves of allthese things and have failed. We need to discover that we cannot accomplish this alone, but that which we cannot do, God can do when we give Him the opportunity. In Filgrim's Progress you will remember that Christian was freed from his burden at the Cross. Outside the walls of Jerusalem there was a place where the garbage and rubbish of the city was burned. This rubbish heap was kept burning all the time. In New Testament times the place was called Gehenma and became a synonym for hell. Ferhaps there is something very suggestive here that people should think of hell as the place where the rubbish is burned. This is one of the real problems with which each of us must deal, how to get

rid of the rubbish. In "The Mind Goes Forth" the Overstreets say: "But there is nothing, perhaps, that we more drastically need to learn than how to call an

But we keep on sewing patches. That is why we fail to find any real vitality in our faith. In the forty-third chapter of Isaiah the prophet says: "Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old. Behold, I

am doing a new thing !" Get rid of the rubbish.

Let us face this, that just to get rid of rubbish is not enought. Jesus again says: "When the unclean spirit has gone out of dman, he passes through water-less places seeking rest; and finding none he says, I will return to my house from which 'came. And when he comes he finds it swept and put in order. Then he goes and brings seven other spirits more will than himself, and they enter and dwell there; and the last state of that man becomes worse than the first."
