COMPLY WITH REQUEST MADE BY ROOSEVELT

Legislature Gives Service Body Jurisdiction Over Omnibus Operation

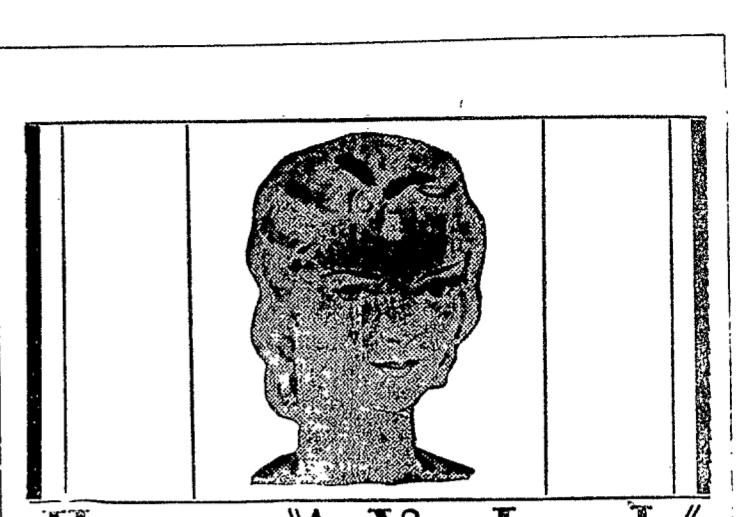
SOUTH GLENS FALLS BOARD SUBMITS FIGURES SHOWING COST OF PROPOSED SCHOOL

Erection of Building Will Entail Expenditure of \$179,885--Special Election Will Be Conducted Monday for Approval of Purchase of Site in Hudson Street

To enlighten voters as to the cost of construction, the South Glens Falls board of education has estimated that the public school which it is proposed to erect in that village will cost \$179,885.

As an answer to criticism among many that several persons vote illegally, the board declared last night it was anxious to have qualifications for voters understood by everyone. They follow:

- (1) A citizen of the United States.
- (2) Twenty-one years of age.
- (3) A resident within the district for a period of thirty days next preceding the meeting at which he offers to vote; and in addition thereto possesses one of the four following qualifications:
 - (a) Owns or hires, or is in possession under contract of purchase or real property in such district liable to taxation for school purposes, or
 - (b) Is the parent of a child of school age, provided such child shall have attended the district school in the district in which the meeting is held for a period of at least eight weeks during the year preceding such a meeting, or
 - (c) Not being a parent, has permanently residing with him a child of school age who shall have attended the district school for a period of at least eight weeks preceding such meeting, or
 - (d) Owns any personal property, assessed at the last preceding assessment roll of the town exceeding \$50 in value, exclusive of such as is exempt from execution.
