Harold W. Griffis Appointed Trinity's Minister

On Sunday morning, September 14, the Reverend Harold W. Griffis will assume the pastorate of Trinity Methodist Church. Mr. Griffis has been serving as the Superintendent of the Albany District of Troy Conference since 1954. Previously he had been the minister at the Methodist Churches in Jonesville; Williamstown, Mass; Trinity, Troy; First, Amsterdam; and Fifth Avenue—State Street, Troy. He also served a two year term as Superintendent of the Troy District.

Mr. Griffis is a native of Gloversville, N.Y. and is a graduate of Wesleyan University at Middletown, Conn. Mrs. Griffis is also a native of Gloversville and is a graduate of New York State College for Teachers. They have three children—James, who graduated from Wesleyan University and now lives in Troy; John, who graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, and is now

living in Colorado Springs; and Nancy, who is still at home and will be attending School 16.



Mr. Griffis is a member of the General Commission on Promotion and Cultivation of the Methodist Church, a member of the Board of Managers of the Methodist Hospital in Brook-(Continued on Page 2)
