

Baptist Burying Ground

Soueth of Nine Mile Tree, By
Old Baptist Church.

May have been some 60-80 graves
(aunt, Watsou Blanchard.)

Dennie Burying Ground

On Paradise Point, Jackson Hill
on old Kasson Rd.

On north or left side of road
going toward Paradise Point.
A few rods east of Banks place,
Bar way in old wall was entrance.
Graves were four or five rods from
road and north east of drive bar
way. ~~all~~ All surface indi-
cations of graves now gone.

Clayton Jackson remembers (1936)
that when he was a boy two marble
stones were there. Does not recall
names. Perhaps were those of
Jacob Dennie and wife who
lived on the place.

Likely the stones were removed
and the place plowed. But Clayton
Jackson does not recall that the
field has been plowed in forty
years.

The farm passed to Col. Banks
who was son-in-law of Jacob
(over)

Dennie.

The farm is now (1936) owned
by Mortimer Hollenbeck,

Burying Ground .

On farm of W. J. Griffis

few graves, may have been children

Jackson Burying Ground,

An close lot overlooking
Sacandaga Reservoir,
East of Mayfield-Northville Road,
Just north Denne Hollow,
Entrance to hill just north
of inlet of Reservoir. Open field.
No fence, About 25 graves,
Only two marked stones.

Dell Reynolds Mayfield b. 1938
said that when he was a boy the grave
of Capt Jackson was enclosed by
posts and chains.

Jackson Summit Burying
Ground. (might be called Dunning
Burying Ground)

On a ridge west side of road
at Jackson Summit - On road
leading toward Gloversville and
near Chan. Barker place.

Maybe a 100 or so graves. Only
few marked in any way. Only
three lettered stones. The graves are said
to come down to near the road.

Alida = 1772 - 1836 wife of
James Bogert.

Sarah Maria - 1809 - 1813
Daughter of James Bogert.

Anna Bogert - 1799 - 1821

wife of J. Allen, ^{a Bogert probably the}
Peter Van Buxstirk + his father who married
Some Van Buxstirks said to
be buried there.

Mrs Rivers and daughter buried
there about 1934.

Likely some Dunnings buried
there; for the ground was off their
farm. They lived there Chan.
Barker now lives (1936) (over)

Some six of Rivers buried there,
A member of Betters there,

William Shingfield buried there,
Some Halls maybe there,

A number of people came here
to work in tannery, Some
died here and were buried in this
ground. Good many buried there
and graves said to come near road,

Lansing Burying Ground,

On Brooks farm west of house
and in edge of woods. Some
distance south east of Mayfield to
Munsonville Road. An older
road went near burying ground,
About ten graves.

The one marker of note is a bronze
monument = "This monument
erected in 1900 by the grand
children of Jacob and Helena
~~Lansing~~ in memory of the
Lansing family whose ancestors
came from Holland early in
the 17th century and settled in
this part of the State,

The Lewis farm adjoining ground
was Lansing farm.

Water Burying Ground,

In corner of Walter Woodworth's farm; - corner of West Main Ex. + Beach Rd, Richard Woodworth said he remembers, as a boy, riding, past that corner with his father. The latter called his attention, to fact that spot was being plowed. The field stones, unlettered, were removed. Was of opinion that some 40-50 graves might be there, Doubtful, if so many.

(Luke Rice says burying ground is in above named corner.)

The burying ground said to have been about half way between the Church + "The Eleven O'clock Line".

The story is that a certain Anderson was plowing up the burying ground. Some one told him he would fall into a grave. While plowing he was stricken with paralysis from which he never fully recovered. For years

after that no one ventured to cultivate that ground. The farm passed to other hands. A second attempt was made to plow the ground. Soon after the plowman was stricken with typhoid. The third attempt succeeded.

Authentic Richard Woodworts and Lucie's Rice;

Burying Ground Polmantown
Road. N.E. old long building

No named stones said to be
eight graves,

Grove Mrs Polman on West side
of road, at north end of small bridge
on high point in woods.

Tolmantown Burying Ground,

A small burying ground with no lettered stones, field stones on right of road and near the ruins of an old loghouse.

Maybe some Browsers buried there. (See Tolmantown)

Mrs Wendell Tolman buried on headland on bank of stream on left side of road going up Stone with name.

Warner - Sweet Burying Ground
Gifford Valley.

Wilson Burying Ground
Corner Mountain and Warner
Hill Roads.

No cut or engraved stones.

Wilson family lived near and
some of them buried there.

Ludowick Wilson and wife
Betsey Collins buried there.

They were parents of Ed Wilson -
see Wilson. He died about 1880.
Ground not cared for.

About 30 graves there probably
all Wilsons.

Reynolds & ~~Terrell~~ Burying Ground

At top of Terrell Hill, Turn R. on drive-
way opposite Zimmer Camp. Burying
ground in front of Pettengill Camp, and
on low knoll. Four field stones facing
and near drive way. All the markers of any
sort there are (1941) These are probably the
graves of four children of Deborah Rey-
nolds and who is buried there,

Niles Reynold's burying ground, according
to Mrs Richard Terrell who lived near there

John Warner (1841) said were some
Terrells buried there. Years ago he owned
that land about and there were some
field stones which had fallen and the location
He took away some five or seven stones
the graves for which he could not locate ex-
actly. He was plowing there and a
horse went into a grave on which the
top soil then settled

So probably some 12 to 15 graves there.

John Warner said were Terrells buried
there.

(Town Historian there. Apr 28 1891)

Burying Ground,

An farm now (1936) occupied by John Dutcher, on corner of Road from Dennie Hollow to Jackson Summit. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. from house.

Said to be few graves marked by field stones. Nine or ten graves thus marked.

Ground is in edge of woods and on bank of small stream, near quite large pine tree. Some rods N E. of Dutcher barn. Land probably owned by Merle Haines

S. Christie thought Wilkins might be buried there

Dan Lusk says that Nicholas Dennie, - the Tory is buried there and some of his family. Only one burial in Lusk's time; - that a child of Moses Gifford. Says more graves there than their stones indicate

Terrill + Dutcher Burying Ground,

On Jennie Johnson farm, Mile or so west of Mountain Road on old road leading off at the Snyder farm. On top of high knoll above house, open field.

About 25 graves, Only one stone lettered.

John Dutcher died 1883,
Co A 115 N.Y. Volunteers,

Richard Dutcher died about 1880
Lucretia " in grave
with no lettered stones,
other Dutcher's there.

(Peter Johnson bought farm from Stewart Christie's grandfather, was first a log house on farm.)

Gershon Terrill and wife and probably other Terrills buried there (Grandfather of David Terrill.)
